Where is it?


Church Lane is one of a plethora of alleys and lanes in lakefront Oueenstown, and a brief walk from the town's 120 licensed establishments.


Who goes there?

Lovers of style, comfort and intimate service.

What's inside?

Starck lamps blend with Flos lights and Eames chairs in front of the

Did we mention the huge plasma screen with Windows Media, bathtub built for two, massive balcony with Dedon furniture, shag rugs, loads of leather and wall-hugging red hue? We're staying in.

Serve it up

Dining is exclusive with no more than

20 guests for nightly degustation. Just like your own private dining room. Choose from seven or 10 courses with matching wines from the menu created by New Zealand's leading chef and Gordon Ramsay protege, Rex Morgan.

Cost? \$NZI35 (\$AII3) for 10 courses without wine or \$NZ195 including wines or \$NZ95 for an a la carte-style

seven courses with chef's surprises, wine extra.

Still hungry?

Do it all again come sun up. Breakfast for guests is a lengthy, relaxed affair with baked muffins, brioche and sourdough, vanilla rice pudding with peach, prosciutto and buffalo mozzarella egg dishes.

Thirsty work

Copper is the new black in The Spire's bar where metal work provides the bling. DJs, jazz, Latino and rhythm and blues musos provide the soundtrack and everyone dresses designer down. Hotel guests go to the front of the queue.

Extras

Chocolates are so passe, turn-down time means miniature tubes of New Zealand springwater eye gel left on your pillow - a blessing at the end of a typical Queenstown night of Otago wines and fireside banter.

The history

The Spire was supposed to open in November 2004 but didn't open until May 2005. Christiaan Palsenbarg and his business partner, Eric Wegman, wanted to get it right the first time.

A prototype suite was constructed for faux guests who gave feedback. Another prototype, more feedback, a third prototype and their work was

In the first year of opening, the property has graced the pages of stylesetting Wallpaper Magazine and was the only Kiwi property to make the hot list of both the British and US Conde Nast Traveler.
